On this special day of the year we pay tribute to *Vivienne Rutgers* retired Cape Town school teacher whose career spanned more than 40 years, and whose belief in the value of nurturing empathy in her learners, is helping to reconceptualise the fundamentals of Education.



We first met Vivienne in 2003 when, as a teacher at Forest Heights
Primary School in Eerste River, she came to our Caring Classrooms display stand at the City of Cape
Town's Youth Environmental School at the Chrysalis Centre in Tokai.



It was the start of a journey together to introduce learners to the concept of care and respect for all living things began.





By 2006 international animal welfare organisations had become aware of her work and, with the blessing of her principal and the WCED, she accepted an invitation to address an international symposium in London on 9th June 2006.

The symposium was hosted by the World Society for the Protection of Animals (WSPA).

The topic of her presentation was

'Can Education help?'





1 - Kindness to Animals

builds compassion and empathy for other living creatures. This is the first and truly foundational step that supports all the other steps above it.

2 - Kindness to Each Other

is another important step, guides the interaction between people of the same family or social group.

3 - Kindness to Other People

guides the interaction between people of different families or social groups when they meet in a common place.

4 - Kindness to Our Country

encourages national common respect for the laws of one's own nation, traditions, and political structure.


5 - Kindness to Other Nations

encourages respect for other nations and their unique laws and traditions.

6 - Kindness to The World

shows respect for the whole world, for other nations collectively living their varied lives.

Says Vivienne:

"If we are to produce first-class citizens, we need to reform education."

She tells many stories of how humane education has influenced learner behavior. Among them is this one...

"On another occasion recently, we unlocked the classroom for the day's schoolwork to begin, only to find a little bird had somehow been shut in all night. It perched on the rail above one of the windows and was clearly traumatised by the sudden surge of 46 children into the room. Before the introduction of the Caring Classrooms programme, I believe the children would have caused pandemonium trying to catch the bird. Instead, they heard me... I said 'sit quietly, I'll open the window, and we will be patient while the bird finds its way out'.



The little bird took a significant amount of time to do this but as it hopped nearer to the open window, one child whispered 'nearly there', as encouragement to the bird. To hear that whisper, all 46 children had to have been as quiet as mice. Then several of the children whispered 'nearly there' with every hop the bird took in the right direction. And we all whooped when it finally flew out.

That 'nearly there' whisper of encouragement was empathy in action across species, and I hadn't seen it before."




